# UP Manila - College of Arts and Sciences Recognition Day Exercises, 22 April 2014

My dear friends, the Class of 2014, I am honored to be with you today as you celebrate this very important milestone in your lives.

I graduated from college myself almost two decades ago. Time seems to have flown so fast, but in fact, two decades is a lot of time for many things to change. For someone like me, more than two decades is more than enough time for me to prove that (and I am not saying this because I am a Filipino) the Philippines is the most beautiful country in the world, Filipinos are the most beautiful people, that the Filipino Spirit is incredibly inspiring, and that this nation is worth fighting and dying for and more importantly, worth living for.

Kanina po at tuwing inaawit natin ang Pambansang Awit, Lupang Hinirang. Ang mamatay nang dahil sa iyo.

As my own journey brought me to five continents, and practically to every region of the Philippines, from Aparri to Tawi-Tawi, from the West Philippine Sea to the Philippine Deep, I have also realized that the path to discovering the Filipino Spirit is not a clear path. On many occasions, I had to struggle to understand whether this Republic even had hope of being a country with a clear national identity. It was on this same journey that made me realize that success in life means more than what many of us perceive it to be.

At the onset, let me reflect on why I stand before you today. I am not a wealthy businessman. I am not a talk show host. I am not a rock star. I did not invent a really cool cellphone. I am not a famous politician. And no, I am not Iron Man.

It is my belief that my passion to defend Mother Earth and fight for our country is the main reason why I was given this honor to address you today. And what a perfect day for us to be together as we celebrate and commemorate the Earth Day on its 44<sup>th</sup> year. Happy Earth Day po sa inyong lahat.

Certainly, nobody will ever forget November 8, 2013, as it is forever etched in our hearts, even painfully, when the strongest storm in the history of humanity made landfall in the Philippines. And three days after Super Typhoon Yolanda hit the

Philippines, I was given the honor of standing on behalf of the Philippines at the United Nations Climate Change Conference in Warsaw, and appealed to the whole world to take urgent action to address the planetary crisis. We all know how Yolanda devastated communities and claimed thousands of lives.

It will also be recalled that while I was in Warsaw, I underwent 14 days of fasting in solidarity with Typhoon Yolanda victims and all victims of climate injustice and exploitation all over the world. After those two weeks without food, I had lost more than 26 pounds. Every 1<sup>st</sup> of the month, hundreds of thousands of people around the world are joining me as I fast for the planet. On May 1<sup>st</sup>, millions around the world will be joining. Today, Earth Day, I again stand with many people around the world who are embarking on a 10-day Fasting for the Earth. #nasisiraankanabangbait #malalanasiguroangproblema

When we talk about saving the planet, it must mean the planet needs saving.

But let me summarize the planetary problem in three words. All these three words start with the letter A. Avarice – extreme greed, which has driven the gap between the rich and the poor wider. Arrogance – the belief that we have absolute dominion over nature. Apathy – which I would explain by borrowing the words of Robert Swan: "The greatest threat to this planet is the belief that someone else will save it."

Because of Avarice, Arrogance, and Apathy, we find ourselves in a deadly mix of problems that is devastating the environment, driving more people into poverty, and destroying the moral fabric of our society.

Indeed, Mother Earth is asking for help. The kind of environment we see today is even much different from the environment we saw when I graduated from college. The water, air, and land have become very polluted. All over the world, garbage, especially the accumulation of non-biodegradable waste, has become a very serious problem. Many species of plants and animals have gone extinct, some of them even before they are even discovered by science. Every year, up to 300 species of plants and animals go extinct, forever. Today, 5,000 species of animals are officially on the endangered or threatened list.

A lot of things can happen in 20 years. A lot of heartbreaking things have happened to the environment between my graduation and yours.

Today, every living natural system in the world is in serious decline. Every living natural system. Rivers, lakes, oceans, forests, coral reefs, watersheds, fish, wildlife, birds, mammals, reptiles, tropical countries, temperate regions, even polar regions – everything is in bad shape.

Here in the Philippines, more than 90% of our fish stocks have been decimated. You also know that fish spawn and breed in coral reefs. Today, less than 1% of

our coral reefs are in excellent condition. As for our forests, from as much as 30 million hectares of virgin forests 100 years ago, we are now down to only less than 1 million hectares of virgin forests or about 3% remaining. Many of our rivers have been rendered biologically dead and are among the dirtiest rivers in the world. The mountains are denuded and our sources of water are also becoming compromised with the continued abuse of the environment all in the name of economic progress. As a result of human neglect, we suffer from massive floods, disease epidemics, and a host of other environmental problems. The Philippine Eagle, supposedly a proud symbol of our country, stands in a precarious situation as possibly as few as 180 eagles remain.

And then, we have climate change – the most serious problem that humanity has ever faced. Now, I invite you to take a very deep breath. We are the first generation of human beings to inhale air with more than 400 parts per million of carbon dioxide. The increasing concentration levels of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere are driving the climate into chaos.

Climate change is happening here and now, and things will get worse before we see anything better. There is no doubt that climate change would deepen poverty thereby posing a tremendous challenge to social and human development.

If climate change is not addressed urgently and adequately, it could seriously hinder our aspirations, not just as a country, but also for each one of you personally, for a brighter future. As such, we do not have the luxury of time.

I don't think I have to elaborate on the profound impacts of climate change. Super Typhoon Yolanda has done that already.

I wish to emphasize that your generation and the generations to come will bear a lot of the impacts of environmental degradation. BUT ALSO your generation is the generation that is in the perfect position to **make a difference** and turn things around.

As you culminate your student life in UP, I wish to send your way some reminders that UP does not merely stand for University of the Philippines.

In the context of the upheavals, trials, triumphs, and evolving story of your lives and the unfolding history of the University, the two letters UP stand for a lot more.

# <u>UP means UNDERSTAND (YOUR) PURPOSE</u>

Let me tell you a story about a man who found his purpose.

This is a love story. There was a man who fell in love with a woman. Itago na lang natin sa pangalan na Victor. The man fell in love with a woman, but even

before they became a couple (bago naging "sila"), the woman was diagnosed with cancer of the thyroid. According to the doctors, it was not the harshest prognosis and many have gone to live normal lives after surviving thyroid cancer. But then again, her mother succumbed at the age of 53 to cancer as well. So the news came really as a chilling shock to both of them. At that point, the woman told man, "Hey let's just try to think through this carefully. I'm sick. You've got to let me go." "Let's just be friends." #friendzone. Ouch. It never really occurred to Victor that the situation could lead to that. He told her "we'll get through this together and let's take it one day at a time." A month later, she was in the hospital for a major surgery and her entire thyroid gland was excised so as to remove the disease. You've got to think about this very seriously. I'm not well," she said half-joking. But in a more serious tone, she said, "You will have to take care of me for the rest of your life." At that moment, Victor told her, "That is exactly what I want to do for the rest of my life."

You see, this was my own love story. Now, this is not Ted Mosby relating "How I Met Your Mother." You see, before my wife and I had a family of our own, we had to go through this difficult time. You know, my young friends, my wife usually would not want me to talk about this in public and I apologize to her for spilling out the beans, but for today, as I stand before you, and as I look at your faces and into your eyes, I truly know this is a special day for you so I have decided to let you in on this very personal story. Because I want you to know that since that moment, I knew what I was on Earth for. I realized my purpose. Everything else was a bonus. And that is why it is easy for me to stand for what I believe in. Because I have nothing to lose.

And that is why I stand before you today.

I am also a SCUBA diver and an avid wildlife photographer. Just last week I went diving in Tubbataha Reefs and it truly was amazing. I love nature - I love the smell of the ocean breeze. I love looking at the stars on a lovely clear evening. I love to travel and I enjoy the sound of waves on the beach or the symphony of birds and the chirping of crickets.

These are important because excellence would mean nothing if you cannot appreciate the beauty of life. Success means nothing if you missed out on the beauty of God's creation and the simple sources of happiness in life, if your family is not happy, or if you have no friends.

Have a life that allows you to smell the flowers. A life that allows you to ENJOY THE VIEW. A life that allows you to serve people who are in need. A life in which you are loved and you love others. A life in which you are interdependent and CONNECTED with others. A life which allows you to be UPHOLD THE PRESENT.

The pursuit of excellence is usually a road filled with good intentions but riddled with temptations to be selfish. Excellence is not so much about material wealth or fame. It is about being here – it is about being a real GIFT to others – about being PRESENT. I am sure you saw the movie, "Kung Fu Panda", one of my kids' favorite movies. In one of the scenes, it was said - "Yesterday is history. Tomorrow, a mystery. But today is a GIFT. That is why it is called the PRESENT."
